A conference was held this morning in Strafford County Superior Court.

Chad E. Evans, 29, of 191 Milton Road in Rochester, will be tried on one count of second degree murder and several assault charges in connection several assault charges in connection

with Kassidy's death.

Evans and his attorney, Alan Cronheim, were in court this morning along with Assistant Attorney General Christopher Carter. Prosecution and defense counsel approached the bench to discuss scheduling issues with Judge Tina L. Nadeau. Following the 15-minute proceeding, Carter explained the judge in another murder case being handled by the

murder case being nationed by the attorney general's office had requested the week of Nov. 5 for that trial. Carter said the Evans trial will be postponed a matter of weeks, to the end of November.

Kassidy was the daughter of Evans' Amanda girlfriend, 19-year-old Bortner.

The girl was pronounced dead at York Hospital in York, Maine, on the afternoon of Nov. 9 after her mother hought her from the residence she brought her from the residence she shared with Evans to the home of a rel-Bortner would later tell police that Evans repeatedly beat her daughter for

about six weeks prior to her death. Affidavits filed at Rochester District Court in the first days after Kassidy's death cited examples of abuse Bortner told police that Evans threw Kassidy head first into the walls of the

Kassidy head first into the walls of the Rochester residence, gagged her to stop her from crying, and grabbed her stop her from crying, and grabbed her face in a "palming" fashion.

Bortner also told police she and Evans "both routinely told people who inquired that Kassidy's bruises and

injuries were the result of her falling down stairs or off the trampoline" and agreed not to seek medical attention for the girl's injuries, according to the affidavits.

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for several area McDonald's restaurants, has been free on \$100,000 corporate surety bail since Nov. 22.

Evans is forbidden from having contact with Bortner, members of her family and other state witnesses in the case. His bail conditions, however, do not restrict his contact with children.

Bortner has not been charged with any crimes in connection with her daughter's death. She is spending

her time alternately between the Seacoast and Texas, according to family and friends.

In addition to this morning's preliminary pretrial and status conference, a final pretrial conference is scheduled for Oct. 25.

When asked for comment, Cronheim said he is continuing to review the more than 1,400 pages of discovery material in preparation for the November trial.
