Somersworth woman granted bail in assault

ROCHESTER — A Somersworth woman has been granted a \$5,000 personal recognizance bail for one charge of second degree assault and one charge of simple assault in connection with a Sept. 16 fight in downtown Rochester.

Amanda Donnell, 20, of 80 Stackpole Road, is accused of punching a former friend in the mouth and breaking one of her teeth. She was charged with second degree assault, a felony, for that offense.

The victim had to be transported to Frisbie Memorial Hospital for immediate treatment to her mouth, according to court documents.

Donnell also allegedly hit another woman three times in the face during the September altercation at the intersection of Portland and South Main streets. She was charged with simple assault, a misdemeanor, for that offense.

During her arraignment recently at the Rochester District Court, Donnell received a \$3,000 personal recognizance bail for the felony charge, and a \$2,000 personal recognizance bail for the lesser charge.

Judge Franklin Jones ordered that Donnell have no contact with either of the victims. A trial for the simple assault charge has been scheduled for Feb. 16 at the Rochester District Court.

A probable cause hearing on the felony charge has been planned for Dec. 15.
